
Working from rest

Linking Projects


Intergenerational Linking

Intergenerational Linking has had a great start to the year with Scout Groups beginning their links with Care Homes and we still continue to add School and Care Home partnerships.

Currently, the way the younger and older people connect remains predominantly virtual or remote including sharing messages, words of wisdom and photos as well as singing songs or asking each other questions over a video link.







But as we move towards the Spring we hope partners will be able to involve face-to-face events and to support this we have been able to offer small amounts of funding for the schools and care homes to make these meetings memorable and fun for all.

Playing board games, sharing stories, singing, yoga and gardening together are some of the activities planned as part of Intergenerational Linking this year. Other plans include children and residents planting a tree to mark the Queen's Jubilee or creating a time capsule together, as well as making and sending Easter-themed cards and gifts.

Schools Linking

As we start the Spring Term, our Primary schools are taking part in many creative exchanges with their partners – sharing bunting to introduce themselves, writing poems to explore their identities or exchanging school jumpers.







Secondary schools are engaging in the project through a programme of lessons known as Shuttle Dialogue where the two groups of young people take part in the same activity within their own class and then share their work with their partner class as a way to learn about each other. All are finding the work very rewarding—be it in developing students' self-esteem or pride in their own identity or in strengthening their understanding of intersectionality or the positivity of diversity. As one teacher said "Doing this project has given our students a voice and shown diversity is an advantage, it's beautiful, it's enriching...it awakened our students to this concept...that they can bring their authentic selves to school every day".

Prevent Programme

Shama Women's Centre

Prevent Services Officer, Louise Cox, recently visited one of our locally funded Prevent projects, The Shama Women's Centre, when they hosted a talk by Nicola Benyahia from Families For Life.

Nicola spoke about her personal experience of radicalisation and shared her tragic story about the loss of her son, Rasheed, who was radicalised and left for Syria where he was killed.

Nicola delivered an in-depth presentation which enabled discussion around the dangers of online grooming and radicalisation and created awareness of the warning signs/different ways in which extremists may target individuals, whether that be with mental health vulnerabilities or via conspiracy theories etc. Nicola shared proactive solutions to counter extremism along with signposting of where to seek help and support. It was a very well-attended and engaged event with participants asking lots of questions together with Nicola providing case studies and interactive activities.

Nicola ended the talk with Rasheed's story and spoke about the impact on her life thereafter which was such an important and poignant reminder of the dangers of extremism and the devastation it can leave behind. Nicola's story seemed to resonate with the group who were clearly very moved and some took photographs of the slides, particularly in relation to the warning signs. Feedback to The Shama Centre included... "feeling encouraged, inspired and motivated to talk about this difficult topic with family and friends".

It was humbling to see the first-hand the impact of some of the work that our projects are undertaking and the collaborative work with our communities to bring people together to help prevent incidences of terrorism.



Eyres Monsell Club for Young People

Louise also attended another of our projects, Eyre's Monsell Club For Young People, where Nicola Benyahia gave a talk to the young people about the dangers of radicalisation.

Having previously watched a film featuring Nicola entitled "my son joined ISIS", the young people were really looking forward to meeting her in person and listened intently without interruption. They were clearly intrigued and moved by her own personal story. Nicola explained how she now works as a trained counsellor helping struggling young people and families in the hope that they never have to suffer a similar tragedy. She spoke about some of the manipulative tactics that extremist groups use to recruit young people and how this is usually a slow process, from making a simple connection (online or offline), to then gently building a relationship of trust before the radicalisation process begins.

She shared case studies of young people who had been befriended via social media or gaming, only to be later exploited or threatened emphasising the importance of staying safe online.

The young people were given the opportunity to get to know Nicola as a person and hear about her family life before and after the death of Rasheed and were able to ask Nicola any questions.

It was great to see our projects taking a joined-up approach in order to create a positive, impactful event to build resilience to extremism within society, and also to see the young people being given the opportunity to have open discussions and conversations, empowering them to explore areas and issues they may have not otherwise thought about. Engaging with a real-life situation such as this helps to debunk fake news and myths around the stereotyping of people from different faiths and backgrounds and helps to educate the young people to different views and facts so they can make their own informed decisions.

Feedback from some of the young people included... "I was surprised about the propaganda that's online and how easy it to go down the wrong path without you knowing you are". "I was shocked. This is real life and not just a person talking like in a school".

Paul Carlton, Deputy Manager from EMCYP said... "just

listening to Nicola's story has made an impact and will be something they won't easily forget, particularly seeing the effect it has had on Nicola and her



family. I think the young people will think twice about clicking on random links and free online games on the internet"




Nottinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service Training
