Five years of confident Christianity

For many people living in the UK, inter-religious encounters are simply a normal part of daily life, whether at work or school or with their neighbours. This may be because of where they live, where they work or their particular interest or passions.

I've found inter-religious activity to be an immensely rewarding part of my life in Leicester. Our city and county have a long, and proud, history of living well together with people of all religions and none. Celebrated as the most diverse small city on the planet, Leicester sets an internationally recognised standard for friendship across religions. But we cannot presume this will continue; as people have invested time and energy in interfaith engagement in previous generations, so we must continue that today.

Over the past five years, the Methodist Connexion has resourced St Philip's Centre to carry out all kinds of interreligious activity, as part of our "confident Christianity" project. As we engage, we can be confident in our Christian identity. We want to distinguish confidence from cockiness or arrogance; recognising that we do not know all the answers or have all the skills or resources. Confidence in Jesus Christ is marked by humility, by gentle and courteous sharing of life and faith, building trust and co-operation with people of all religions and no religion.

Engagement with those of other religious communities can take many different forms. During the project, we have comfortably exceeded all our targets for engagement with different types of events. Over the five years of the grant:

Our target for general events was 2,900 people – we reached 3,022.

Our target for our Abrahamic group was 125 people – we reached 227.

Our target for Hindu-Christian conversation was 80 people – we reached 246.

Our target for Sikh-Christian conversation was 80 people – we reached 208.

We saw particular successes with:

Series that built over time – such as Reading with Rabbis or sessions on the seed verses of the Gita, or prophets in the Abrahamic traditions. We also ran a popular series of visits to local places of worship.

One-off events with well-known people. For example, an event on the connections between Sikhs and churches in the UK, where a popular Sikh historian spoke.

Partnership working, leading to annual engagements, for example with Methodist Women in Britain and with the Queen's Foundation.

I could not have completed this project on my own. During the five years of the grant, I had the privilege of working with two wonderful colleagues, Laura Johnson and James Blackhall. Both have been a delight and an inspiration to work with. We have also benefited from collaboration with many of our faith practitioners, who have tirelessly worked with us to help people understand different religious perspectives and build relationships of trust and cooperation.

James' Reflections on his work at St Philip's Centre

As my time working at St Philip's Centre draws to a close, I've been reflecting on how we have worked to help people live well together during that time. Most of my work has been around the Leicester and Leicestershire areas but has also been a privilege to travel around various places of the Methodist Connexion speaking to groups about interfaith and helping to facilitate conversation.

Some significant highlights for me have been: hosting a workshop with Solutions Not Sides to help local Christians think through the complicated issues of the Middle East; leading a workshop on *Hospitality, Service and Proclamation* at the Methodist Conference, being part of the panel about interfaith work organised by the Nottingham University Chaplaincy; working with groups of those training for ministry to enable them to encounter people of other faiths ,ask questions and visit places of worship; working with local churches to meet people, often for the first time, from other faith communities in their area. I have also really enjoyed visiting local churches with people of other faiths and taking part in Sunday services or women's groups, Mothers' Unions and Leaders of Worship and Local Preachers' meetings. Please do continue to get in touch with the Centre if sessions such as the ones listed would be of interest to your church or group.

The main purposes of the role: Promote, develop and encorage Christian interfaith engagement

Ensure the Centre delivers the objectives set out in the project "Confident Christianity," which is funded by the Northampton District of the Methodist Church

Explore the potential for new activity which supports and strengthens associations between Christians and people and groups of different religions and ethnicities, including people of no faith.
