# **Work with Churches**

#### **Christmas is Coming!**

On Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> December I held two 'Christmas is Coming ....' event sessions. Christmas crafts, and mince pies were used as vehicles to encourage talk sessions about how as people of different faiths, we celebrate Christmas in the U.K.

The first session was a group of 5 Sikhs discussing Christmas with myself and 2 other Christians – one Caribbean and one British. The Sikhs all said they wholeheartedly celebrated Christmas. They were all going to help distributing presents on Christmas Eve and serve a Christmas dinner to others less fortunate on Christmas Day. They were all planning to go home to a big family Christmas lunch afterwards with presents for the children. They all respected Christ and knew that Christmas celebrated Jesus being born. Some of the Sikhs involved in the discussion had received a blessing in Church the previous year. A good natured discussion followed as to what should be on a Christmas dinner.

The second session comprised people from many different backgrounds – myself, two Caribbean Christians, two Bulgarian Christians, one Indian Hindu, one Indian Muslim and five Bangladeshi Muslim's. One of the Caribbean ladies said that on Christmas Eve, her Island tradition was to leave out meats, cheeses and drinks for the Ancestors – even though she said that she would have better use of it than the ancestors! Christmas Eve was also the time to make and hang new curtains and paint all rooms in the house. Traditional drinks were made with sorrel and ginger.

The Bulgarians said Christmas Eve was also important to them with a big vegetarian feast being held. They told us that for Bulgarian Christians celebrating was much like in Britain with churches and homes being decorated and presents given. Christmas Day started with Mass followed by the rest of the day eating and celebrating with family.

The Hindu Indian lady told us that she usually celebrated Christmas with a meal with her family but little else. The Muslim Indian lady told us that she celebrated Christmas with lights around the house and a chance to gather with her family. She said that when growing up, Christmas lights had always been up around her village and although she was Muslim, there were Christians around and so she was aware of the meaning of the festival. The Muslim Bangladeshi women told us that they celebrated the festival time of Christmas as it was the only time of year they had off at the same time as the rest of their families. They had food, some had presents and a good get together but there was no religious element to it – it could have been any time of the year as far as they were concerned. I later spoke to a young Muslim woman who said that her family had celebrated Christmas as the birth of the prophet Jesus but that her married family did not celebrate Christmas in any way.

There were some good discussions between all the participants as to what Christmas meant to them, and all had an enjoyable time.

## **Work with Schools**

At the end of last year, St Philip's Centre was delighted to engage over 200 children at Fleckney Church of England Primary School who hosted our interactive, exciting and fun packed 'Religion & Belief Roadshow'. The event takes the form of a festival with clothing, food, crafts, artefacts and music aplenty whilst a series of stalls are spread across the hall. These tables are overseen by our team of faith practitioners who inform children and answer their questions. The Roadshow worked with years 3-6 and was a highly successful occasion.



Feedback from Fleckney CofE School has been superb: "This was an exceptional experience for our KS2 children. It offered a unique and engaging opportunity to explore nine different faiths in a hands-on, informative and interactive way. The children were fascinated by the artefacts, especially the clothes; they enjoyed asking questions and the older ones were able to make connections between different belief systems. The facilitators were knowledgeable and helped to make the learning experience fun and memorable. The roadshow deepened the children's understanding of diverse cultures and faiths as well as promoting our school Christian values of compassion, respect, responsibility, community, fairness and aspiration. Overall, it was an invaluable learning experience."

In July 2024, BBC TV, BBC Radio Leicester and BBC Online featured our Religion & Belief Roadshow. In 2025, we will be taking the concept to South Yorkshire and to the East of England.

We are pleased to report that we have been approved as an RE Hubs accredited provider. This is very helpful to showcase our quality delivery and the standards which we work to.




